Did You Know??

Sometime, in the late 1920's, a few unhappy members of the local Assembly of the Society of American Magicians decided that they were not getting their money's worth from the 50 cent annual dues they were paying. These individuals, led by one Andy Buel, contacted the I.B.M. and asked if they could establish a local club in St. Louis. They were told "Yes" and formed themselves into a "Chapter." Other Chapters were soon formed by magicians in other communities.

Representatives of these various Chapters met to determine a name for their groups, and our Andy Buel came up with the name "RING". This suggestion was quickly embraced by the conferees. It symbolized the idea that all the Chapters (or Rings) were linked together a la the classic "Chinese Linking Rings." The conference further decided to change the name of the monthly publication from the "Bulletin" to "The Linking Ring."

As a reward for its leadership at this conference, the I.B.M. elected to designate Saint Louis, RING #1.



Stage Directions

After our recent performance, it occurred to me that some people do not understand theater terminology, so I thought I would share this with everyone. These directions were imperative to our stage manager Chuck Peterson and our lighting director Terry Walthaw.

Stage directions include center stage, stage right, stage left, upstage, and downstage. These guide the actors to one of the nine sections of the stage named after the center and four directions. Corners are referred to as up right, down right, up left, and down left. See diagram below.



"Upstage" means away from the audience, towards the back of the playing area. "Downstage" means close to the audience, near the front of the playing area.

"Stage right" and "stage left" indicate the point of view of the performer standing in front of an audience. Their mirror images are "house right" and "house left," which describe the same directions, but from the opposite side—as if you are looking at the stage. Read this line again as many people get confused. Nothing worse than you telling the lighting director that you will be entering from Stage right, only to appear in the dark on Stage left.

Communication is KEY and all cues, and directions should be written out BEFORE the show and gone over in tech rehearsal. That means the stage manager gets a set of cues, including the sound engineer and the lighting director. EVERYONE needs to be on the same page to ensure the success of the production.

X Marks the Spot

Steve Buesking was showing me a trick the other day over breakfast and it reminded me of something I used to do years ago. A simple card trick using a double backed card and a double lift. Simple right?

Place the letter X on the back of the double backer. Use a thick black marker. Place this card on the bottom of the deck with the X facing up. Have a card freely selected (be careful not to expose the bottom card when spreading the cards) and place the selected on top of the deck face down. Cut the deck once burying the selected card somewhere near the middle. This will place the X card above the selection. Spread the deck until you come to the X card. Cut the deck at that point placing the X card on top. Do a double lift and leave the face up double on top of the pack. Thumb off the face up selection and when you turn the card over, the X has vanished!

Patter: I used to say something about pirates burying (chosen card gets buried in the middle of the deck) their treasure and marking their map with an X. Spreading the cards to reveal the X (the treasure / chosen card). But then hiding their map because if someone found the map with the X , they would know where the treasure would be. Then the X vanished off the back of the card. Something along those lines if I remember correctly. Be inventive and come up with your own story. Instead of an X, you use a question mark. Lots of ideas to be explored using double backed cards.

Next month, I'll share a great one using a double facer!

This was quite the honor to have your name on this prestigious award.

Sad to say, I can't remember the last time we had a Youthsayer Show. The reason for this is simple. The club has no youth. No youth means no growth. The Ring is open to suggestions on this subject. How do we get more youth involved? What can we do to get more youth involved? This is one of the biggest and most important issues facing our Ring. Are you on the PTA (Parent-Teacher Association)? As a side note, while attending the recent President's Banquet, my wife made the comment, "Where are the young people at?"

When I was younger, we had a cut-off date for the stage contest for the Midwest Magic Jubilee. The reason for this was there were so many people who wanted to compete, the contest


would sometimes run up three hours in length! Today we are hard pressed to get enough contestants to compete to even have a stage contest.

Veteran's Show/Spring Show/Haunted Hayloft – I always hear the same comments. "It's always the same people." The only answer that I can come up with is that nobody does stage magic anymore. Or should I say, good stage magic. My granddaughter has done a magic act for her fourth grade talent show but I wouldn't consider putting her on a paid event for the club. When I first joined the club, the norm was that everyone did some close-up magic and some stage magic. Most of us started doing children's birthday parties. As the years went by, close-up magic has moved to the front of the line, leaving stage magic to take a back seat. I really think everyone should have at least a good ten to fifteen minutes of magic that can be done on a stage. This doesn't have to involve expensive props either. Ropes (any good cut and restored routine, Professors Nightmare), cards (Cards Across, Card to Lemon, Six Card Repeat), coins (Misers Dream). Etc. Remember, it's all in the presentation.

Before paying for the next hottest download of the latest and greatest card trick, pick up an old book and learn a few good standup/stage tricks. Who knows? You may like it!
