
Max Maven Live Lecture

Focus

Lots of magicians have trouble learning magic because they have a problem focusing on one thing at a time. For example, if you want to learn magic from a book it'll probably take you a week to read it (properly) and another few weeks to try out the content. The same goes for learning marketed routines. It takes time, concentration, and focus. It should also be a joy. Dai Vernon said that if practice is a chore, you best take up another hobby. He also said that magicians go to their magic drawer to find their cups and balls but find rope, coins, and cards instead and subsequently

get waylaid from the cups and balls routine. Focusing is almost a skill in itself, but it's essential for good magic learning. So, may I suggest the following: Pluck a book off your shelf and read it. Once you have read it, read it again with the props nearby. Do this for at least a week before you watch another dvd/video/download etc. You'll find it hard, but I hope you trust me enough to know I'm saying all this to help you. Another reason that magicians come and go is due to the fact that they can't see the woods for the trees due to trying to learn everything at once. They get fed up and can't cope. So, slow down! There's really no rush. X ♥ Paul Gordon MIMC **Magic History** by Steve Zuehlke Most of you know that I love magic history. While it may not seem important, everyone who practices our art should be well-read. While "jamming" with Jimmy "Cards" Molinari, I found it fascinating he knows the origin or every trick/move he performs. This prompted me to go out on the Web and find out what other people think. Read the comments below. I am glad I am not alone in the world when it comes to magic history. Or history, in general, for that matter. It couldn't hurt to know how magicians explored ideas and themes in performance over time. Also, now that magic is starting to vet its literature it would be useful to know whose life's work you are using in your act so you can seek them out if you have questions. I was always of the school of thought (to steal a quote) that those who do not know history are deemed to repeat it. There are so many "inventions" today that have been published in periodicals from fifty years ago. Mike Caveny's and Todd Karr's great tomes are of tremendous value. By reading the biographies of past performers, you can see their development and how they grew. Plus, I feel that just reading these books gives me a deeper respect for magic's rich history. That's one reason why I started my one podcast, to record interviews with magicians and share them freely with the community. Their stories (and the ones told by Caveny, Karr and all the others) tell us so much." You must respect your predecessors for laying down what we know today. Read Steinmeyer's "Hiding the Elephant". If you don't immediately fall in love with the history of magic, then you ain't a magician. Once you've read Steinmeyer's book, watch "The Prestige" on DVD. Even though it's not real history, it has the feel of the era down pat. Then read all of the books you can find by the pioneers and perfectors of the magic craft: Hofzinser, Hoffman, Maskelyne, Annemann, Bobo, Blackstone, Hugard, Corinda, Tarbell, Hay, Scarne, etc. You'll get a real feel for where magic came from, and how it has progressed. One thing you'll find that will surprise you - there's almost nothing you can 'invent' in magic that wasn't already invented, in some form, 100 years ago! But knowing the history will allow you to appreciate the subtle twists and embellishments that contemporary magicians have added to the old principles to make magic even more magical that it was when they found it. Just Google a few of the names mentioned above and a whole new world will open up! •]•
